I am Chaehyun Kim from the GLP-GEfIL program. With your generous scholarship, I was able to participate in the Pembroke College Summer Programme and fully enjoy not only the Cambridge experience but also the UK experience. My hopes for studying at the Pembroke College Summer Programme were to experience a different academic system and learn diverse culture.

I took three classes in total: Sustainability, Employability: Personal Branding, and behavioral ecology. All three classes were comprised of 12 lectures and 8 seminars in total, where lectures were delivered through the professor explaining theories and case studies through PowerPoints and seminars were more based on student discussions, presentations, and field works. This was a different method of learning for me as at the University of Tokyo classes would usually be either in the form of a lecture or a seminar, not both. Every weekend, I went to two-days trips to various parts of the UK – I went to London, Brighton, Birmingham, Edinburgh, and Mt. Snowdon – with my friends. It was fascinating to see how different cities in the same country can have differences in architecture, especially their colors, and how such differences could make the cities hold different atmosphere. Travelling around the UK has definitely added to my UK experience to not only understand their academic aspect but also their cultural aspect. Having been studying over the weekdays and travelling over the weekends for the whole 6 weeks, I am confident to say that I had enjoyed the Summer Programme to its fullest potential.
